#### Welcome to the Lysefjord

The Lysefjord offers some of the world's most iconic hikes. The classics Preikestolen, Kjerag and Flørli are most known, but the 42 km long Lysefjord is also home to a wide range of other more off the beaten track hikes, all with great vistas.

On the map (--), we have selected our local favorites in the Lysefjord: the **top 10 hikes** with a fjord view.

Kjerag is also part of the **Lysefjorden Rundt** Trail, one of the country's most spectacular multi-day hiking trails. It connects Kjerag with Flørli and Preikestolen, running from fjord to mountain, and back down again several times. It winds past old mountain farms, disused hydropower settlements, mountain lakes, gorges and rock cliffs, over bedrock and through lush forests. In addition to beautiful nature, you can discover many cultural-historical treasures.

#### Lysebotn

Nestled in the heart of Lysefjord lies the quaint power village of Lysebotn, which has been providing electricity to significant portions of the country since the 1950s.

This charming village is home to only a handful permanent residents but attracts throngs of tourists and BASE jumpers from around the globe during the summer season. It serves as the ideal base camp for embarking on the Kjerag hike and numerous other day treks. Here, you can also begin or conclude your multi-day hiking adventure along the Lysefjord.


Lysebotn offers a variety of amenities, including accommodations, café, country store, disc golf course, and tourist information center. Situated at the very end of the fjord, it provides ferry access to Flørli, Songesand, Forsand/Preikestolen, and Lauvvik.

For those traveling by car, a scenic drive featuring 27 hairpin bends will lead you up the mountain to the Kjerag Trailhead and the mountain pass that connects to Sirdal.

The Kjerag Massif is renowned for its towering cliffs that soar 1,000 meters above the Lysefjord. Perched near the edge, the Kjerag Boulder rests wedged in a crevice of the mountain, a remnant from the massive ice sheet that once covered Norway over 10,000 years ago. The Kjerag Trail is a challenging and weather-exposed hike through varying terrain, featuring three steep hills and a mountain plateau.

# Frafjordheiane Protected Landscape Area

Kjerag is located in the protected landscape area (*landskapsvernområde* in Norwegian) of Frafjordheiane. It is part of system of 17 protected zones in Setesdal and Ryfylke, established to conserve a truly unique and awe-inspiring landscape. It is home to Europe's southernmost wild reindeer population, high-altitude mountain ridges abundant in plant life, and cultural relics and pastoral landscapes that reveal a lengthy and diverse history of use.

The highlands boast a remarkable array of contrasts. To the west, you'll be captivated by the stunning and dramatic scenery surrounding Lysefjorden and other Ryfylke fjords. The northern region features towering mountains with snow-capped peaks well into the summer months, complemented by pockets of vibrant, flourishing wildflowers. To the east and south, you'll find an expansive, undulating terrain dotted with countless picturesque lakes and streams.

Within these highlands, a population of 3,000 wild reindeer can be found, perpetually migrating between their favored grazing locations.

Please treat our protected zones with respect they deserve. Stay on the trails, don't take anything but pictures, and leave nothing but your footprints.
